

Directors February 2021 Report

Libraries need Friends, plain and simple. Historically across our country, public libraries like NADL exist because of the dedicated efforts of community members seeking to establish and support libraries in their communities. In fact, to receive a Carnegie grant, residents of the village of Newaygo had to agree to provide a building site for their library AND to support the operation of the library at a cost of not less than \$500 annually.



Library Friends are people just like you and I who understand the value NADL is to our community and who also know that libraries need community support to thrive, not just survive.

How does NADL benefit from its local Friends group?

NADL benefits by the expansion of resources to serve the public:

 Through dollar gifts generated through used book and baked goods sales, the Friends has provided funds for such items as: Books; bookcases; DVD cabinets; library remodeling; decorative rugs and furniture; computer chairs; a digital camera; summer reading program shirts; guest speakers; and equipment such as a television and DVD player for programming.

NADL benefits by being in a more competitive position for grant funding:

- In 2017, the Friends formed an endowment called the Marilyn Davis and Jane Bode Fowler Fund for
 Friends of the Newaygo Area District Library through the Fremont Area Community Foundation. An
 annual disbursement from the endowment will support summer reading programs at NADL for
 years to come.
- When applying for grants, NADL is able to demonstrate tangible support from the very people who use and benefit from the library.

NADL benefits through advocacy support within the community:

- Friends are advocates by default, going to bat for the library by donating their time, energy and financial support! The Friends were an essential part of fundraising when the former facility was renovated and enlarged in 2012-2013.
- Friends continue to step up to the plate every year for advocacy needs as they arise.

Consider becoming a Library Friend! The next Friends meeting is March 25 at 5 p.m. at NADL. Unable to attend? No worries! Friends work in many ways to make sure their library is strong, relevant and well-funded. The Friends accept donations of clean used books and DVDs through library staff for bookstore sales. Donate time to help manage and organize the book store weekly. Shop at the bookstore, too. Be on call to bake and donate baked goods for holiday sales. Volunteer to help staff at library events. Tell the people in your neighborhoods about ways NADL will provide reading materials, programming, and services for lifelong learning, technology, and personal economic development.

YOU can make a difference at your library to make NADL the place to learn, connect, and explore!














1. UPCOMING ACTIVITIES AT NEWAYGO LIBRARY

5. Building & Maintenance.






7. Friends of the Library.




MARCH FEATURE AUTHOR JACQUELINE WINSPEAR

"As Europe buckles under Nazi occupation, Maisie Dobbs investigates a possible murder that threatens devastating repercussions for Britain's war efforts in this latest installment in the New York Times bestselling mystery series."

Jacqueline Winspear was born and raised in the county of Kent, England. Her grandfather was severely wounded and shell-shocked at The Battle of the Somme in 1916, and it was as she understood the extent of his suffering that, even in childhood, Jacqueline became deeply interested in the "war to end all wars" and its aftereffects. As an adult her interest deepened to the extent that, though she did not set out to write a "war" novel, it came as no surprise that this part of history formed the backdrop of Maisie Dobbs and other books in the series.





APRIL FEATURE AUTHOR CHRIS BOHJALIAN

"A young Puritan woman--faithful, resourceful, but afraid of the demons that dog her soul--plots her escape from a violent marriage in this riveting and propulsive historical thriller from the #1 New York Times bestselling author of The Flight Attendant.
