


Director's Report

In his book, "Palaces for the People: How Social Infrastructure Can Help Fight Inequality, Polarization, and the Decline of Civic Life," Eric Klinenberg said that when we invest in social infrastructure, such as libraries, parks, and schools, we reap benefits such as interaction with people from our community, and connection to a broader public.





In this age of cell phones, tablets, and computers, the danger as a society is that people tend to grow socially isolated. Social infrastructure such as Newaygo Area District Library (NADL) is a glue that binds communities together. By "social infrastructure," Klinenberg meant the physical spaces and organizations in our communities that mold the way people interact. It is just as real as water, power, or communications, but it is often more difficult to recognize its importance. ¹



Klinenberg's use of the term "Palaces for the People" actually comes from Andrew Carnegie. Carnegie was committed to the idea that the U.S. was a country where people could improve their lives. His experience of being a poor immigrant's son but rising to become a wealthy entrepreneur influenced him in later years to invest his funds in education, science, music, and PUBLIC LIBRARIES, the greatest of which he called, "palaces for the people."

Not many places in our communities remain open to everyone and require nothing of visitors. But at libraries such as NADL, anyone and everyone have access to friendly, knowledgeable staff; social interaction; on-site resources and information; technology and scanning helps; computers stations; study rooms; magazines; books; arts and humanities instructions and classes; lifelong learning explorations and resources; and literacy learning opportunities such as story-times and book clubs. ¹ "The Complicated Roll of the Modern Public Library by Jennifer Howard. At NADL, people make copies and send faxes for minimal cost. Cardholders may also check out much more than books. NADL offers free check-out of digital books; DVD movies; laptops; hotspots; cameras; board games; puzzles; STEM kits such as Legos and Ozobots; cake pans; metal detectors and hand tools.


Books will be available in the upper level of the Library or on Libby by April 11. We will meet as a discussion group on May 18 in the Conference Room.




